Your Next Steps

Welcome to the Next Step booklet.

It is produced by the Participation and Inclusion Team at Enfield Careers Service and aimed at 16–18-year-olds who might need a bit more guidance to continue with their education or training.

We understand that the journey to education and training can be daunting for some young people. Therefore, this booklet aims to guide you through the process.

Each section has an action for you to complete. By completing these actions, you will add to your knowledge and gain the confidence to make an informed decision about your education or training option.

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1. The Raising Participation Agenda (RPA)

You might have heard about this. It was introduced in 2013. Are you clear about what it means for you? The RPA relates to the law that states all young people must stay in some form of education or training until they are 18 years of age. This means that you have the following options available to you after year 11:

Stay in full-time education, for example at a college or sixth form

Start an apprenticeship or other work based training

Spend 20 hours or more a week working or volunteering, while in part-time education or training

Gives you a sense of achievement

Improves your earning potential

Opens up new opportunities

You can also apply to any sixth form, college or training provider of your choice outside Enfield borough.

Courses available



A levels

A two-year course.

Available in a range of subjects with an exam at the end.



Vocational courses

Job related courses such as BTEC's and NVQ'S.

This involves practical work.



T Levels

A new qualification designed by employers.

This includes an industry placement.



Apprenticeship

A paid job.

Available in four levels – intermediate, advanced, higher and degree.

Case study: My journey after an apprenticeship

What have I gained?

“After completing my level 3 apprenticeship in Business Administration, I got a job as an Employment and Training adviser at Enfield Careers Service. This role gives me the chance to put into practice the skills and knowledge I gained from my apprenticeship such as the different approaches to work with stakeholders.

I am now able to use this knowledge to collaborate with the stakeholders I work with such as young people, schools, employers, and other teams within Enfield Council. For example, I gather feedback about our work from young people who attend our careers events and our service use their feedback to plan future activities. I now fully understand the importance of meeting the requirements of all stakeholders because that is the best way to ensure that they continue working with our service.”

The other skills I have gained are



“Excel skills – I have learnt how to use the pivot tool to organise data and this helps me to be more efficient with my tasks.”



“Community Engagement: My role requires me to attend events and meetings to promote our service, for example, I recently attended an event in a school, and I enjoyed engaging with the students.”



“Organisational skills: I am responsible for planning and organising my workload. I make sure I follow specific procedures. I now understand the importance of consistently producing high quality work. I have learnt how to produce clear notes/guides to refer to if I am struggling and this helps me to be independent.”

My advice to young people

“Just give it a go. Whatever you do, do it with 100% effort. Whatever your next steps in your career are, whether it is sixth form, college, apprenticeship, employment, volunteering, or anything else, always do your best. If it does not work out, then you can try something different, applying the lessons that you have learned in the past!”

2. Other Options

Employment

Preparation to enter employment is key because it can help to increase your confidence. Activities such as research, work experience and volunteering can help you prepare. These activities can also help you to understand how varied factors such as government policy and technology affect different jobs. These factors are called Labour Market Information or LMI for short. However, remember that these factors can change overtime. LMI can help you:

Understand the skills employers need you to have.

Compare the pay for different jobs.

Broaden your knowledge of different job sectors.

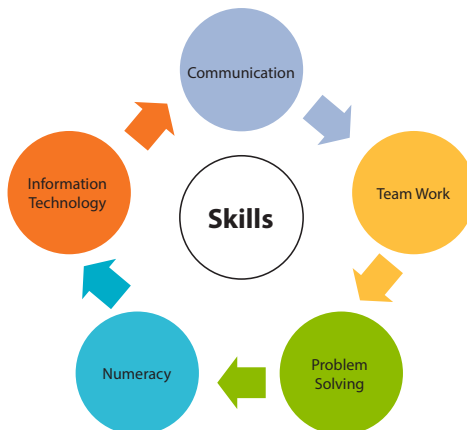

Employability skills

A skill is the ability to carry out certain tasks. A skill can be learned, developed and enhanced. Employers will require you to demonstrate your ability to carry out a range of tasks when you apply for a job. The chart below shows the key employability skills that employers would expect you to have.

Entrepreneurship

This is about starting and running your own business. The entrepreneur's journey starts with an idea to make a change. This change can relate to a product, service or experience. To take your idea forward, you would need to consider your motivation, the changes you would like to make, the impact of the changes, your niche area, risks, and costs. Good commercial awareness and high level of resilience can help you with your journey to become an entrepreneur.

Higher Education

An option you can consider when you are 18 years old. The courses include degrees, diplomas and there are many different courses available. You would need to consider several factors such as entry requirements, cost, assessment methods, facilities, potential employment opportunities after the course and the institution's reputation. Many universities now offer virtual tours and webinars which can be a fantastic way find out about their courses, campuses, and facilities.

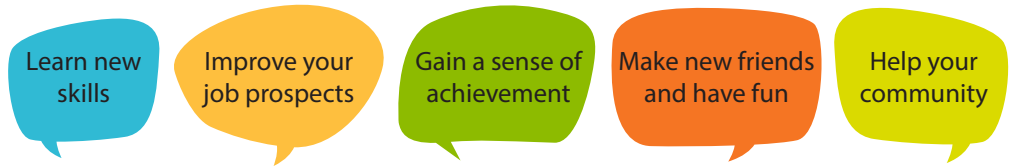
