


Ward Profile: Oakwood 2024



Oakwood is situated in the west of the borough. It is bordered by the Southgate, Cockfosters, Ridgeway and Grange Park wards.

It is served by the postal districts of N14, N21 and EN2.

The ward falls within the parliamentary constituency of Southgate and Wood Green.

Ward Profile: 2024




Population

Based on the 2022 ONS mid-year estimate, the ward population is estimated to be 8,702, having increased by 5.4% since 2011..

Age Profile

The ward has higher than average proportions of older adults and relatively low proportions of 15-34 year-olds. The split between male and female residents by age band is in the chart (bottom).





Language


Socio-Economic Factors

Key features:

- The ward has relatively high numbers of adults in managerial and professional occupations.
- Household incomes are higher than the borough average, with relatively low numbers of households in poverty.
- 2.7% of adults are on unemployment benefits and 14% of households on Universal Credit far lower than the borough averages
- Deprivation Indices: the ward has low deprivation levels it is among the 50% least deprived wards in England.
- The proportions of households in fuel poverty are lower than the borough average at 8%
- Crime levels are lower than the borough average
- Health: at the 2021 Census, 86% of residents reported Very Good or Good health
- Higher than average numbers of households are owner-occupiers.
- Levels of educational attainment are higher than that of the borough population in general.



Low Income Households


Data from CACI Ltd indicate that, as at 2024, households in the ward have an average (median) gross household income¹ of around £60,500 per annum, which is above the borough average. It is also higher than the average for the London area.

The percentage of households with an annual income below £25,000 is shown in the chart below.



The chart below shows the distribution of annual household incomes in the ward by £20,000 bands, with comparator areas.

As can be seen, higher than average proportions of households in the ward are in the higher income bands.



- 129 were in families of Absolute low income³.






Benefit Claims

- As of April 2024, the unemployed claimant count⁴ in the ward was 145
- At February 2024, 490 households (including working families) were claiming Universal Credit

Economically active people


In 2021, the estimated proportion of people aged 16-64 who were in work or looking for work (the economically active) was higher than the borough average, at 77.1%. The proportion in employment was 72.6%.

Deprivation score

The Indices of Deprivation 2019 – published by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government measure **relative** deprivation in neighbourhood areas (Lower Layer Super Output Areas). These are ranked and sorted into deciles of relative deprivation.


Oakwood is among the least deprived 50% of all wards in England.5

The map below illustrates how deprived the neighbourhood areas of the ward are, compared with all such areas in England. Darker shading indicates higher relative deprivation levels.




5% of Enfield's neighbourhood areas are among the 10% most deprived in the country, with a further 25% within the 20% most deprived. The chart below shows how the neighbourhood areas of the ward compares with this, and with the distribution in England.


Ward level ⁶ deprivation deciles are shown in the map below. The wards with the highest relative deprivation are shaded in darker red.






Crime

Metropolitan Police data for the period April 2023 to March 2024 indicate that:

- There were 412 notifiable offences in the ward a rise of 6.7% on the previous year.
- The most numerous offence categories were Violence Against the Person and Vehicle Offences.
- The crime rate per 1,000 residents⁸ is shown in the chart below right, with borough and regional comparators







Health


The 2021 Census asks residents to describe their general health. The chart below illustrates the response:



Ageing in a state of good health is obviously a desirable aim where possible, and the Census provides a snapshot of the health of people in different age groups. A separate analysis divides the population into those whose health is broadly 'Good' and those for whom is it 'Not Good'. The chart below details the percentage of under 65s and over 65s who describe their health as Good.




Life Expectancy information at ward level is not yet available for the 2022 Ward boundary geographies. However, data are available at Middle Layer Super Output Area level - another census geography with boundaries that do not match those of wards. These are mapped below for male and female residents: the darkest shaded areas have the highest life expectancy at birth.

According to the 2021 Census, 1057 residents had a disability (as defined under the Equality Act 2010). The proportions by age band are shown below.










The 2021 Census data provides a view of the accommodation type by ward compared with the rest of the borough.




