Please note my objection to Enfield's continuous destruction of Green Belt Land. You are trying to destroy the area's greatest asset. It seems this flies in the face of any so-called green policy that is being espoused. However energy efficient the proposed housing may be relative to older designs, it will still permanently desecrate the area's flora and fauna, depriving both residents and visitors of any access to nature. During the recent lockdowns, it's those green spaces that have kept many sane. It's those green spaces that absorb carbon dioxide and improve air quality for all.

We have already lost about a third of Trent Park to totally unaffordable housing and I am sure in fifty years time there will be nothing left except a concrete jungle as you drip feed the developers little bits of land at a time, for short term profit. But once those assets have gone, you will have lost them forever. The precedent has been set. Meanwhile the city centre will just become a no-go region with lots of empty office blocks that could have been repurposed..

We need more trees, not less. They are the lungs of the city. Yours faithfully
