> In an era where sustainability and the importance of green land and precious wildlife is so sacrosanct I find these proposals devastating. It is our duty to conserve and protect the precious green spaces and fragile biosphere instead of tearing them down. There are hundreds of brownfield sites that would offer a much better alternative for housing. Whilst I sympathise at the plight of people wanting new housing there are less environmentally deleterious sites that can be chosen instead and there must be some pushback to central government that keep stipulating blanket policies without any heed to the nuances and complexities of local issues.
