To whom it may concern,

It is with great concern that I am responding to Enfield Council's proposed Local Plan.

The vast majority of Enfield residents pride themselves in the Borough's history and green spaces, most of which are open to all and provide respite and stress relief not only to locals but also many of those that reside in higher density areas across London.

It is with the many benefits in mind that the Mayor of London is looking to preserve as much Green Belt in the City and its surrounding boroughs as possible. However, what is being proposed by Enfield Council appears to fly in the face of the views and policies expressed by Mayor Khan and will create high density populations in parts of the Borough that currently lack the required infrastructure for such rapid population growth.

For a Council that espouses the protection of the environment and quite rightly wants to implement green policies, I fail to understand how the proposed Local Plan fits in with those ideals.

Indeed, by creating more pockets of high density population within the Borough the environmental impact will be significant specifically, greater pollution, inadequate infrastructure, congestion and the associated stress and behavioural impacts of high density living.

In regards to the Local Plan, in particular I object to the following proposed policies;

All of the above draft policies are proposing the de-designation of Green Belt.

The Green Belt must be preserved for our children and our children's children the destruction of which currently proposed in this plan by Enfield Council will only lead to a deterioration of the local environmental, economic, ecological, and social landscapes.

The Government appears to have stepped back from the brink in relation to the destruction of the Green Belt and I would expect a more environmentally and socially aware Labour Council to do likewise.
