Dear sir,

I was astonished to see Enfield Council's assault **on our greatest asset, the Green Belt**, by proposing to urbanise it by considering giving planning permission for housing.

The Green Belt is one of the diminishing jewels in Enfield's crown! Planning permission like this is disastrous. The scale is so large that all it will do is enable some building firms to make a lot of money and in the process destroy a large part of Enfield's heritage to the detriment of most of the population!

Once these sites are gone **they are lost for ever** and for our Council to be party to this is unforgivable, and will no doubt be reflected at the next Council elections!

This is on top of plans to allow totally unacceptably high buildings in Enfield Town and other sites in Enfield.

Specifically on this draft plan the proposal to build on either side of the A110, **Ref Policy SP PL9, Pages 80-87**, I see from Cromer Homes's glossy brochure amounts to 5,000 homes. This is appalling!

It is an area of **Green Belt Land**, well-used by residents of Enfield for exercise and other leisure pursuits, and is an open space much needed at any time and particularly at times of crisis like the one we have recently endured!

Similarly the land at Crews Hill, on either side of Whitewebbs Lane, **Policy SP PL9 pages 77-80 and Concept Plan Figures 3.10**, is under threat.

This is a further plan to build 3,000 homes and an assault on another part of **Green Belt Land** well used by Enfield residents.

This is another open space much loved by Enfield residents and used for exercise and other leisure pursuits, and is essential for our mental health.

The proposal to give permission to build on land at New Cottage Farm and Holly Hill Farm, **Ref SA54 page 374** is a further assault on **Green Belt Land** and is similarly totally unacceptable for the very same reasons.

This is on top of other actions, like making Green Lanes more dangerous to most residents by narrowing the carriageway and installing a cycle track on the pavement and neglecting our parks.

All in all I feel that the Council should not give planning permission for the destruction of part of the Green Belt and reconsider other planning proposals which will see the Borough over populated and with further pressure on our schools, transport and medical services.

I feel that these proposals were very poorly publicised, to the extent that I wonder whether this complied with legal requirements, and sincerely hope that the Council will reconsider its approval to the draft plan.
